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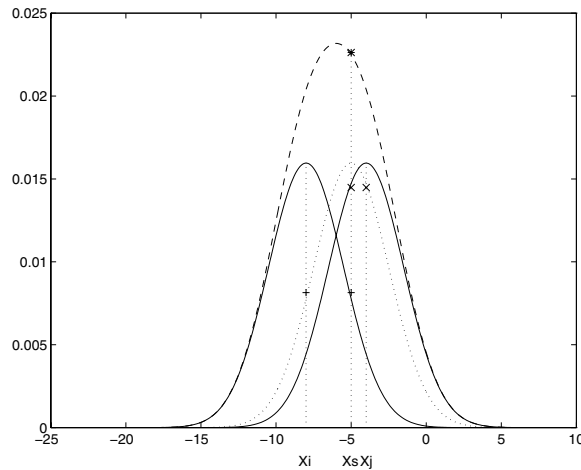
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**Fig. 1.**  kernel at  $x_s$  (*dotted kernel*) or two kernels at  $x_i$  and  $x_j$  (*left and right*) lead to the same summed estimate at  $x_s$ . Equations should be punctuated in the same way as ordinary text but with a small space before the end punctuation mark.

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## 2.4 Program Code

Program listings or program commands in the text are normally set in typewriter font, e.g., CMTT10 or Courier.
